



## **PANEL UPDATE – WEEK 11**

Welcome to this week's update on the 2019 Annual Conference! Each week a session from the business program will be featured. The annual conference theme is "*Regulation Matters*," and the agenda will cover a number of diverse and timely topics confronting the beverage alcohol industry and marketplace.

On Wednesday morning, the last day of the conference, set down your glasses to listen to regulatory and industry experts discuss the US cannabis markets during the panel "Paving the Path for Regulating Cannabis -- Uniting States in a Post Federal Prohibition World."



The current patchwork of state cannabis regulations resembles the landscape emerging from the repeal of alcohol prohibition. "Toward Liquor Control," a 1933 study of alcohol regulation, anticipated what was to come and provided states with a context for making choices about regulatory models, an influence that lingers to this day. Like that work, this panel will: frame important social considerations, define the stakeholders who should have input in regulatory models, and explain how the rocky trails blazed by first-state cannabis regulators can be paved so that regulators of subsequently legalizing states need not face the same challenges. The panel will also touch upon examples from the global marketplace, the industry's long-term viability at the enterprise level and the investment environment.

Join moderator STEVE MARKS, Executive Director, Oregon Liquor Control Commission and his insightful panelists as they discuss the future for regulating cannabis and the economic and social outlook for the quickly expanding and evolving cannabis industry.
